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ABOUT THIS SURVEY

WHERE WE'VE BEEN

In June 2018, the Town of Ridgway launched a year-long effort to update and consolidate the Town's Master Plan. A master plan is a community's primary long-term planning document, defining the community's big picture vision for the future and presenting a road map for achieving that vision. This survey was conducted between July and September 2018 to:

- Develop awareness in the community about the Master Plan process
- Understand what residents love most about Ridgway and their hopes and fears for the future
- Better understand housing needs in the community
- Provide a starting point for exploring how well the Master Plan's current vision, community values, and goals align with the community's vision for the future
- Understand community priorities and preferences for addressing major issues and opportunities facing Ridgway

WHERE WE'RE HEADED

More than 660 people participated in this initial step in the Master Plan process. The results of the survey will be used by the project team to inform updates to the Master Plan's vision, community values, and goals, and to serve as a starting point for diving deeper into any issues, opportunities, challenges, or concerns expressed by survey respondents. The responses will also help us to understand where there is a lack of consensus on a particular topic that will require further community discussion.

PART 1: SURVEY SUMMARY

Survey responses have been combined and organized by the following topics:

- 1. Background
- 2. Choosing Ridgway
- 3. Housing
- 4. Overall Issues and Opportunities
- 5. Visitors and Tourists

Where a free response option was offered for a particular question, a summary of major themes derived from those free responses is provided. In some instances, references to individuals or details that would reveal the individual were removed to protect the privacy of respondents and those referenced.

BACKGROUND


Survey respondents were self-selecting. Of the 664 respondents to the online survey:

- Nearly half of respondents live in the Town of Ridgway. Approximately 49% identified as being residents of Ridgway. Based on estimates for Ridgway's population in 2016, this result suggests that the survey reflects the opinions of around 30% of the town's 1,016 residents.
- Most of the remaining half of respondents live in areas surrounding Ridgway. The
 majority of the remaining respondents lived around Ridgway or in Ouray County. Only
 13% reported living outside of Ouray County, and the majority of those respondents lived
 in Montrose or Montrose County.
- Most are full-time residents. The vast majority or responses came from people reporting
 they live in their place of residence on a full-time basis. Just 8% of all responses came
 from self-identified second-homeowners.


A more detailed discussion about survey respondents and a comparison of demographic groups and socio-economic differences between those who responded and Ridgway's population is provided at the back of this document.

For the purposes of this summary, responses from Ridgway residents have been separated out from other responses. The Master Plan is a document that should reflect the vision of Ridgway's residents, so this was done to ensure that the conclusions drawn from the survey are not skewed by those who do not live in Ridgway. However, there was not a tremendous amount of difference between the responses of Ridgway residents and those who live outside the town—generally all residents of the region share similar concerns and hopes for the future.

Q2: Thinking about your response to the previous question, do you consider yourself to be a:




CHOOSING RIDGWAY

By and large, there was little difference in responses to questions about what brought people to Ridgway, what keeps them here, and what would make them leave between those who identified as Ridgway residents and those that did not. Generally, small town character, scenery/natural beauty, and mountain lifestyle were ranked most frequently as reasons why people decided to move to Ridgway. These are also largely what people said keeps them in Ridgway, along with the community and its people. Respondents reported that too much change or growth or a loss of Ridgway's small town character would make them want to leave Ridgway, in addition to a loss of

the community's scenic beauty/a decline in environmental quality, and an increase in the cost of living that would make Ridgway too unaffordable.

Q3: What brought you to Ridgway? (select all that apply)





Some key takeaways from the responses to this question include:

- Small town character. For residents, the small town character was the predominant reason they chose to settle in Ridgway, with over a quarter of residents mentioning this in their free response answers. The beautiful natural environment, the location, and the community were the next most prevalent responses. Non-residents also valued the small town character of Ridgway, but tended to value the natural environment even more than Ridgway residents. Respondents noted that small town character has a lot to do with the small town population, the lack of development, the slower pace of life, and a hard-to-find quality of authenticity, of "realness," that is not present in larger, more commercial, more touristy towns. Many survey respondents' talk about Ridgway being "off the beaten path" and how they value the peace and quiet this seclusion affords them.
- Sense of community. Survey respondents tended to define community based on the degree to which people are involved in town events and affairs, the overall friendliness of people, and their personal sense of belonging and kinship with their fellow citizens.
- **Relative affordability.** A common theme in the responses is the affordability of Ridgway housing in comparison to other nearby towns such as Telluride and Ouray.
- Natural environment. The natural environment is the second largest draw for Ridgway residents and the largest draw for non-Residents. Both residents and non-residents cite the beauty of the mountain scenery, the weather, and easy access to outdoor recreation as one of the reasons they settled in Ridgway and the surrounding areas. Responses also frequently mention the isolation of the area, calling it "untouched" and contrasting it with the congestion and pollution of the Front Range.


Some highlights from the responses to this question include:

• Community. For both residents and non-residents, "community" is one of the top three keywords in their responses to this question. As discussed previously, community is an often

hard-to-define concept. Here, respondents most often cite the friendly and welcoming nature of the people, the feeling of being surrounded by like-minded citizens, the close-knit ties of the residents. Several respondents mentioned that the strong sense of community is what makes them feel at home in Ridgway. One respondent even described Ridgway's community as like "being part of a giant family."

• Small town character. Both residents and non-residents continue to cite Ridgway's small town character as one of the top three reasons why they stay in Ridgway. The small population and relative lack of tourism compared to other mountain communities are frequently mentioned. The walkability, the "low key feel", and the quietness of the town are also common themes in this category.

As we saw in the previous question responses, Ridgway's people and strong sense of community are some of the reasons residents choose to stay in the area. Conversely, perceived changes in that friendly, welcoming community are by far the most given reason when asked why people might choose to leave Ridgway. Nearly one-third of respondents (31% of residents and 32% of non-residents) spoke about the community in their free responses to these questions.

Responses to these questions included themes of community change, fears of outsiders moving in who may not represent the current resident's values, concerns about wealthy second-home owners displacing long-time locals, and an increase in tourism. Respondents cited towns such as Telluride and Aspen as examples of what they do not want to happen to Ridgway.

Some highlights include:

- Cost of living. Responses that were placed in the Economic Development category typically concerned the high cost of living in the area, the lack of well-paid employment opportunities, the lack of businesses and shopping in the area, particularly the lack of an affordable grocery store.
- Access to care/inability to age in place. While concerns about health & well-being were not the most prevalent responses to this question (6% of residents and 7% of non-residents), they are important to note as it concerns a particularly vulnerable part of the population. Older residents and those with chronic health conditions worry that they will be forced to leave Ridgway due to the lack of medical care facilities and nursing homes. On the other end of the age spectrum, families with young children express concern at the lack of child care facilities, the lack of access to affordable food, and the lack of a 24 hour emergency medical clinic.
- **Housing costs.** Housing issues are cited in the free responses by 9% of Ridgway residents and 7% of non-residents as being a primary reason for leaving Ridgway. Many people mention

the difficulty of finding affordable housing, both in the rental and owner markets. Young families especially seemed concerned about being forced to move due to the lack of affordable housing.

- Growth and development. After concerns about the changing nature of the Ridgway community, fears about the future of Ridgway's land use and built environment were the second-most cited reason for residents (22%) and third-most cited reason for non-residents (11%) when asked about what would make them leave Ridgway. Concerns mainly focused on the pace of growth, concerns about the quality and speed of new development, urban sprawl, and increases in traffic and population. Many people mention that the preservation of ranch land and a rural lifestyle is important to them. However, in a contrasting opinion, a few people mention that the preservation of too much open space and ranch land is contributing to the housing shortage. Also mentioned many times is the sense that the local government cares more about making money off new development rather than improving the quality of life for current residents.
- Changes in natural environment. The natural environment was the second-most cited concern for non-residents (12%). While it was not one of the top concerns for Ridgway residents (4%), the responses are worth exploring in more detail. Respondents expressed a lot of concern about the changing climate, mentioning hotter summers, a drier climate/increased chance of drought, and the increase in wildfires contributing to poor air quality as reasons why they would potentially leave the area. Pollution and the general degradation of the natural environment and wilderness areas were also top concerns in this category.

Common themes in the open-ended comments include:

- Community. Community is the most commonly cited reason by survey respondents when asked when they are most proud of Ridgway. People speak often about how the Ridgway community pulls together to support each other during times of need. People often frequently mention the town's civic engagement and how they love seeing and talking to everyone at community events. The friendliness of the local residents is also mentioned repeatedly in the comments.
- Arts & culture. Access to arts and cultural was the second-most common reason cited by survey respondents for why they were proud of their community. Community events, such as concerts in the park, the farmers market, festivals, and the Sherbino Theatre productions are mentioned frequently. Many people also mention the vibrant arts community, the creative district designation, and public art installations as things they take pride in.
- Local business focus. Economic reasons that people are proud of Ridgway include keeping out large chain retailers like City Market and Wal-Mart and support for small local businesses such as shops, restaurants, and dispensaries.
- **Schools.** Many people, especially non-residents, are proud of Ridgway's education system and the high performing schools.
- Investment in public facilities and spaces. Survey respondents mentioned the completion of the RAMP up project, the improved streetscape, and the new library as things that made them proud of their community.
- **Growth management.** Survey respondents expressed pride in how the town is focused on "smart growth" rather than suburban sprawl. The revamping and beautification of downtown is also mentioned multiple times.
- Protection of the natural environment. About 4% of all survey respondents said they were most proud of Ridgway when it worked to protect the natural environment. River protections, dark sky initiatives, pesticide free policies are all mentioned by more than one person.
- Ridgway of the past. Approximately 5% of survey respondents said that they were most proud of Ridgway in the past, typically between 15-25 years ago. These residents and non-residents don't like the way Ridgway has grown and changed over time. One respondent reminisced about the days when Ridgway was a "quiet cow town."

The reasons that people are disappointed in Ridgway are considerably more diverse than the reasons people are proud of it. For Q11, land use and the built environment, housing, and infrastructure and public services were the next most common answers as to why people were disappointed in their community.

Common themes in the open-ended comments include:

- Community values. Community was the top response for both Q10, which asked what people were most proud of in Ridgway (40%) as well as a Q11, which asked what people were most disappointed in (18%). While people are proud when they see their community come together in times of need and support one another, they are disappointed when they feel the community does not reflect their values. Common themes include: residents disrespecting public spaces, political divisions and conflict with newcomers, lack of civic engagement, and complaints about people being unfriendly or unwelcoming.
- **Public art.** There is a portion of the community that dislikes the artistic style of the new public art, particularly the benches. A frequent complaint is that these new artworks do not represent the town's historic western character and are more emblematic of East Coast "big city" values.
- **Dog issues.** Complaints about people not picking up dog poop, off-leash dogs, and a lack of response to noise complaints about dogs were cited by a number of participants. There were also some respondents who disagree with the new dog leash laws and who dislike the town providing plastic dog poop bags for sustainability reasons.
- Affordability/cost of living. Economic development was one of the top five reasons cited for why people were disappointed with Ridgway. The issue was more salient for non-residents (14%) than for residents (5%). Common issues in this category include the need for an

affordable grocery store, the presence of Family Dollar and other non-locally owned stores, the lack of well-paying jobs, and general concerns about cost of living.

- Infrastructure and public services. This category was one of the top five categories of responses for Q11, with 10% of both residents and non-residents citing this as a big disappointment. The major issue cited here is the paving of streets as some of the residents preferred the old-fashioned dirt roads and dislike the streetscaping improvements. Other issues include new traffic regulations and signs, and new rules about bear-proof trash cans, and water and trash fees.
- Land use and the built environment were also ranked among the top three disappointments for residents (13%) and non-residents (10%). The main concerns include decisions about how to deal with growth and development, code enforcement for unkempt properties, and issues with new businesses such as parking, noise, or light pollution.
- **Drug use/sales.** About 4% of all survey respondents were disappointed in the growth of the marijuana industry in the Ridgway. Several people expressed concern that dispensaries are concentrated in the "gateway" into town. Several people express concern about the "growing drug culture."
- Lack of environmental protections. About 5% of survey respondents were disappointed in Ridgway's handling of its natural environment. Concerns included disappointment over the vetoing of a solar farm, disagreements over how to protect the river, and the usage of plastics and unavailability of recycling services.

Many people indicated that they would like to see the Ridgway remain the same or similar to the way it is today, while very few people indicated they would prefer Ridgway to be as it was in the past. Many respondents cited specific aspirations and desired enhancements for the Town in the future. The common themes from these responses include:

- Managed growth. Many respondents noted that they do not want Ridgway to be substantially bigger than what it is today and that growth that does occur should be carefully managed.
 Peace and quiet, small town character, and protection of open space and wildlife are some of the key characteristics of the town that both residents and non-residents desired to preserve in the face of future growth.
- Services and amenities. Improvements to existing services and infrastructure (e.g., access to healthcare, road improvements) of the Town were highly desired by respondents. An increase in amenities such as a grocery store, community center, and more dining options were also favored by respondents.

• Affordable housing. Ensuring that affordable housing is available for all demographics of the community including families, young adults, and the elderly was also a recurring theme respondents cited.

The top three fears respondents cited regarding the Town's future were that: 1) Ridgway would be transformed into another exclusive mountain resort town like Telluride; 2) Excessive population growth and development would occur, changing the community; and 3) Ridgway would become an exclusive community that only the wealthy can afford to live in. In sum, respondents desire to preserve the small town character and strong sense of community that Ridgway has and any changes that will degrade those qualities are greatly feared. Highlights and key themes from the responses include:


- Resort community. Many respondents indicated that they do want Ridgway to turn into another mountain resort community like Telluride. Specific concerns included: housing affordability, excessive amount of second homeowners, and strong reliance/focus on tourism.
- **Growth and development.** The fear of crowding, traffic, and sprawl were the main concerns that respondents had regarding the town's future growth.
- Affordability. Respondents fear that current residents of Ridgway will one day no longer be able to afford to live in the community. People fear that the town will become a retirement community for the wealthy and that tourism will be the sole focus of Ridgway and not its residents.

HOUSING


The following questions were included in the survey to learn more about the housing issues and challenges residents of Ridgway are facing. As with the previous grouping of questions, there was not a tremendous amount of difference between responses from Ridgway residents and other respondents. The greatest discrepancy arose in question 16 regarding factors that respondents looked for when choosing their current residence; while respondents from both groups considered cost to be their top priority, those living outside of Ridgway gave greater weight to being able to bike to work and stores, services, etc. from their homes.

It should be noted that the survey may not accurately reflect the housing needs or challenges faced by renter households. According to the US Census Bureau's American Community Survey, 38% of Ridgway households were renter households in 2016. In contrast, just 17% of respondents from Ridgway said they rent their home. In addition, the results may not accurately reflect the housing needs or challenges faced by non-family households. In 2016, 47% of households in Ridgway were family households (meaning two or more members of the household were related to one another by blood or marriage). While we did not ask a question specific to household composition, question 14 can be interpreted as such, and suggests that around 84% of respondents from Ridgway lived in a family household (i.e., with their spouse, children, and/or another family member). This is not to suggest that the results are not accurate or useful for the Master Plan process.


Q14: Please describe the type of household in which you currently live. Are you:




Q15: Do you own or rent your current residence?




Q16: Which three factors were most important to you in choosing your current home or apartment? (select up to three)




Q17: Currently, how much does your household pay each month for:




Q18: In the past three years, have you had to move out of a home, condo, or apartment in Ridgway when you didn't want to move?




Q19: If you answered yes to the previous question, what was the primary reason you had to move? (select all that apply)




Q20: Do you plan to move in the next five years? This includes moves within Ridgway and moves to another community.

ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES

In this section of the survey, respondents were asked to rate a number of specific issues within 5 topics (transportation, natural and built environment, housing, economic health, and quality of life) using the following scale: poor, not very good, fair/average, good, excellent. Each of these response choices was translated into a number value (1 for poor; 5 for excellent) in order to quantify an average weighted score for each topic. Across all of the topics, respondents identifying as Ridgway residents gave the following the lowest and highest rankings.


The availability of housing units for rent, the availability of a range of housing types, and access to/availability of child care/preschool were also ranked in the top 5 lowest scoring issues by those who did not identify as Ridgway residents. The quality of our parks and cultural/music/art events/activities also ranked among the top 5 issues with the highest scores for this group.

The following five issues were rated as poor/not very good or good/excellent by the largest number of respondents from Ridgway:



There was considerable overlap in issues that were ranked "poor" or "not very good" and "good" or "excellent" between those who identified as Ridgway residents and those that did not. Although in a different order than above, the top five issues ranked as "poor" or "not very good" were the same across these two groups. This is almost the case for the top five issues ranked as "good" or "excellent"; more respondents that did not identify as Ridgway residents ranked ease of travel by walking higher than biking.







Common themes in the open-ended comments include:

- Loss of community. Many people, both Ridgway residents and non-residents, worry about Ridgway losing its character, its strong sense of community, and its small-town feel as the town grows. There is a strong concern that newcomers will be wealthy and will push out long-time residents, decreasing income diversity.
- Cost of living/jobs. The lack of well-paying job opportunities and the rising cost of living are huge concerns for residents and non-residents of Ridgway. Other economic concerns include the rise of tourism, the lack of an affordable grocery store, concerns over the influx of big box stores and franchises, and the growing marijuana industry.
- Access to services. The main concerns for health & well-being included the lack of an affordable grocery store, the lack of child care options, access to health care facilities, and drug and substance abuse issues.
- Rural character/heritage. Both residents and non-residents expressed concern for the loss of the town's historic rural character and the need to protect ranch land, open spaces, the town's agricultural heritage, and historic buildings.
- Housing costs. Housing was one of the largest topics discussed in response to this question. Both residents and non-residents are very concerned about rising housing costs and the lack of affordable housing, especially for teachers, first responders, public employees, and other vital members of the workforce. Many people expressed concern that they would not be able to purchase a home or that they would be forced to leave Ridgway due to the increase in rent

and cost of living. Many people are concerned with the influx of wealthy newcomers, as well as the increase of short term rentals.

- Infrastructure and public services. Paving streets and providing reliable high speed internet service were cited, as was a concern that there is a lack of public services and infrastructure needed to support current levels of growth.
- Rate and extent of growth. Residents and non-residents are worried that rapid development is changing the town's character and damaging the natural environment. Residents and non-residents alike are deeply concerned about the fast pace of growth in Ridgway and the surrounding areas. People are worried that the rapid development is changing the town's character and damaging the natural environment.
- Environmental protection. Climate change adaptation and mitigation, water resources, fire danger and drought, preservation of dark skies and open space, and environmentally sustainable growth were all cited as concerns.
- Transportation and mobility. Traffic and parking were their top concern for many respondents. A smaller number of respondents mentioned the need for public transportation and bicycle or pedestrian infrastructure.

Common themes in the open-ended comments include:

• Affordable housing. Respondents want access to more affordable housing for working families. Ideas cited by respondents as ways to achieve this vary, but included subsidies for rental housing, donating land for affordable housing construction, inclusionary zoning, deed

restricted housing, allowing for smaller housing units, and limiting short-term rentals, to name only a few.

- **Community involvement.** A more diverse community, more cohesion and unity, encouraging more community involvement and civic engagement, and more community events, services, and philanthropy.
- **Growth management.** Land use and the built environment were identified as the second largest opportunity to explore through the Master Plan process. The majority of these responses concern how to limit growth and development, stop urban sprawl, maintain the small-town character of Ridgway, and how to encourage density and infill development in the right places.
- Tourism/economic development. A chief concern is the creation of jobs, particularly high-paying jobs. Another frequently cited opportunity is programs that support the opening and expansion of small locally-owned businesses. While some respondents support increasing tourism for the sake of economic growth, many other residents want to restrict tourism and new residents in order to preserve the town's authentic character. Several responses mention concern about what is perceived as a proliferation of dispensaries.
- Access to services/care. Responses in this category vary considerably and in some cases
 conflict. While some respondents desire larger more affordable stores, many others want to
 keep the community free of chain businesses and instead support locally-owned businesses.
 Opportunities related to health and well-being include access to better medical care,
 affordable grocery options, day care services, and housing for the elderly were also cited.
- Infrastructure and public services. Opportunities for high-speed internet service, paving the roads, better maintenance and/or improvements to existing infrastructure were all cited.
- Sustainable development practices. The natural environment was identified as the fourth biggest opportunity for the Master Plan process. Many of these responses are concerned with sustainable management of water resources, climate change, fire mitigation, and renewable energy use.
- Transportation and mobility. One of the most commonly cited opportunities was the need for a bypass that would reroute the highway outside of town and cut down on through-traffic. Other opportunities mentioned include increased downtown parking, better bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, and public transportation to nearby towns such as Montrose and Telluride.

VISITORS AND TOURIST RESPONSES

Visitors and tourists primarily hailed from out-of-state destinations. Texas, Massachusetts, California, and New Mexico were most common responses to Question 38, "Where are you visiting from?" All of the visitors were repeat visitors, having visited Ridgway more than once and over three-quarters of the visitors (76%) said they had visited Ridgway more than 10 times. Most visitors indicated that they were staying overnight. Only about 15% of visitors reported only visiting for the day. The primary ways that visitors heard about Ridgway was through previous visits, through family or friends, and by stopping while driving through Ridgway.

Vacation/recreation was the primary purpose to visit Ridgway, followed by visiting family and/or friends. Several visitors mentioned that they were actually visiting Ridgway in order to look at properties for future purchase. Top activities visitors planned to partake in within Ridgway include eating at a restaurant/drinking at a bar, sightseeing and visiting other areas near Ridgway, hiking, shopping, and attending local events.

When asked what they liked about visiting Ridgway, visitors mentioned the food (including local restaurants and the farmer's market) most frequently. Arts & cultural activities and the beauty of the natural environment and local parks and trails were the next most popular responses. Finally, many visitors mentioned the small town charm and the friendliness of the local community as things they liked about Ridgway.

Negative aspects of the visitor experience included issues with infrastructure and public services, especially the unpaved roads and the lack of reliable cable and internet service. Transportation and mobility issue were also mentioned frequently, including the amount of highway traffic and the distance from a large airport. Economic development issues were also front and center in visitors' minds, with visitors mentioning the lack of a large grocery store, the high real estate prices, and the marijuana stores, as negative aspects of Ridgway. However, despite these negatives, 100% of visitors said that they would visit Ridgway again or recommend it as a destination to their family, friends, and neighbors. All visitors were between the ages of 35 and 64.

Community

- People are what make Ridgway unique.
 If growth happens too fast and uncontrolled, town will be filled with people who "just don't get it". An example is all of the people who speed or don't stop at stop signs. Really? You are in a wonderful community, slow down and appreciate it!
- The lack of political diversity. The political climate of Ridgway is primarily Democratic and it should be focused on by-partisan thinking.
- Lack of a community feeling, Not enough economic growth, Unfriendly people, Too many dogs not on leashes, Rudeness
- VERY BIG REASON FOR ME -If fabric of community changes too much because lack of affordable housing. That could make our town an elite community not as much of a diverse community. Diverse in

- age, income, education and goals. We have been very strong in diversity tho lacking some cultural diversity
- Small town people meddling in other people's business and spreading untruths about others.
- Not enough change. I would consider selling my house or running it as a rental in a few years if the demographics don't change more. There are a lot of retired folks and new families, and I would like to see more of a young adult component.
- The change in our local population is probably what would make me think about leaving. Not the change in numbers.... because everywhere is getting crowded, and the increased numbers have given us new restaurants and services.... but I can't help but notice that many of our new residents are retirees and second home owners, and sometimes that can make town feel a little "generic". The last "market correction" or "transfer of wealth" swept through Ridgway like a hurricane. And five years later this is an incredibly different town.
- Community too resistant to progress
- too much gentrification
- The consistent violation of driver's breaking the speed limit. We live near the elementary school and people continuously drive 30-50 miles per hour in a 15 mph zone. It is ridiculous. We have had numerous conversations about this issue with the town and will continue to until this road is monitored more.
- If Ridgway would become too "elite", only affordable to the well off. If we can't provide affordable housing for the teachers, police, government workers, hospitality service employees. That's the

- case now, and this needs to be addressed ASAP!
- It's wonderful to get affordable housing for artists, but we must think of the folks mentioned above."
- If the town just gets mostly bought up by second home owners or VRBO/AirBnB people, it will kill the local community vibe.
- The ridiculous priorities. Money wasted on crappy "art", clutter on the sidewalks, bridge, parks, unreadable street signs, but not on necessities, like a laundromat, health care facilities. Drugs everywhere.
- It is changing and had dramatically changed. A little change was fine, but there is nothing left of the small, quiet town I moved too. There are too many "programmed events" presented every night of the week, sometimes two or three events overlapping and there isn't the population to support them....so too many people from outside are attending.
- If some overall agreement to remove or screen excessive equipment storage is not enacted
- Growth needs to occur in our small beautiful town, for a sustainable economy. We need housing that meets the needs of our locals (\$150 or less), not just the folks who have a lot of money. With this being said, I'd leave if the "friendliness" factor disappears and a Telluride attitude emerges and takes over due to the housing only being affordable to those with high incomes.
- If it keeps turning into a mini-Telluride/mini-Boulder... where are all these people coming from?!?
- If the whole character of the place changed including lack of pride in the community, disregard of our beautiful

- environment, much less friendly people, poor maintenance of all our parks and individual homes and lack of planning resulting in crowded communities.

- I would not be pleased to see Ridgway become a junior Telluride (ostentatious and artificial)
- I have long term concerns about the ability of people with passion but relatively low paying jobs (artists, mountain guides, seasonal recreationists, hippies, and funky people) to stay in Ridgway, both because of increased cost of living, rent, land prices, etc, and because of a changing demographic that would make non-traditional, non-capitalistic people feel less welcome. The "mainstream-ization" of Ridgway. I am scared of this, but it is mostly unfounded fear, as of yet.
- Loss of small town character if Ridgway becomes a tourist destination and feels congested. Growth is bound to occur however, it can happen wisely if priority is placed on serving the needs of those that live here full time (affordable housing, childcare especially prekindergarten, social/mental services, readily accessible open space & recreation, arts) versus those that come to visit or live here part time. I would also consider leaving if Ridgway becomes a destination for festivals or large special events.
- After our experience in how big money ruined Telluride, we feel that it is important that Ridgway manage the growth of the town. Too many second home owners or too much gentrification of Ridgway into "suburbs in the mountains "will turn it into a feeder town

- of Telluride. Not unlike Basalt is to Aspen. We believe efforts should be made to maintain the ranching history of the area and small town character of Ridgway.
- I would like Ridgway to be our forever home. I am concerned about how the town can change with people who may not appreciate small town living and want to conform our sweet home into a mini Boulder. It is RIDGWAY... and no other town. I understand that change is coming and appreciate the growth. At this point I think the growth has been respectful to citizens and conscious.
- I didn't want to live in Mini Telluride
- I have lived in many different places and always passed through Ridgway to see family in Norwood or to work in Telluride. After finally settling here in Ridgway, I have come to find what it was I was looking for and it was Ridgway. I do not ever plan on leaving or moving anywhere else. Although I have marked what might make me leave, it is more of a reflection of the things that I feel are important for Ridgway to be mindful of in their Master Plan.

ification that I see happening. I'd like to see more work done to preserve the ability for regular people to ranch and farm in this county and not be squeezed out.

- Loss of community, too many Air bnbs, focus on bringing in \$\$\$
- Gentrification.
- Being surrounded by rich people that are just out of touch with how real people live and WORK, maybe that's what you want? So the politicals can brag about turning this lovely community into a sunset magazine destination instead of a place where people are proud to raise their families?
- I'm concerned that the local economy and culture has in recent years become focused excessively, I think, on attracting transient, pass-through, tourist activity. We have too many liquor stores, too many dope shops, too many dope grow operations, too many bars, too many parties, some sponsored by and run by the town. Some of this results from the recreational opportunities and the scenery, but I think we need to be more aware of the downsides of becoming a "tourist town," and therefore develop a more diverse approach to fostering our local economy.
- We're blessed to be able to own our house, but if Ridgway becomes another Telluride in the sense that it's "overrun" by second (or third or fourth) homeowners, we would be inclined to find another small, rural mountain town that is a true community with long-term residents year-round, not one that fills up only for the holidays or is dominated by

Our children are being thrown into ideals in public schools and taught lessons that should only be discussed in the home setting. They are being conditioned to desensitize the value of work ethic, responsibility and an honest living. My family moved here to escape the big city hustle and bustle, and now raising my own children here I can't even allow them the freedom of experiencing the area on their own for fear of all the

- strangers and lifestyles that follow them in.

There's not much available to seniors in this community and yet it's where my friends are (mostly of the same age!) so I would be sad to have to leave. Not so much due to medical but due to isolation and lack of support/activities. Also, we can hope our beautiful forests don't all burn down and turn into high deserts! What can we do about global warming?
- Limited access to good medical care
- I cannot know the future but if I had something happen where I could not live here- go blind, someone wanting to kill me, can't think of anything else. Likely the loss of driving ability is a realistic concern.
- Being unable to live at 7000 feet
- Most likely we'd only leave if we needed to be closer to specialty medical services, or to move closer to our kids for various reasons.
- In the event that my husband or I fall incredibly ill I could imagine that we may move somewhere with better health care than this area provides.
- we need better medical facilities for our aging population

- Need for care and assistance when older.
- May not be able to sustain this lifestyle due to old age.
- Get too old or unhealthy to enjoy mountain life style.
- Lack of child care, especially for babies and toddlers.
- There is a real need for a 24 hour medical clinic to service the county, a more affordable grocery option.

- Altitude may become an issue
- I will likely leave because medical care is not good in this area.
- money or illness

Housing

- Lack of space home builds.
- Rent is getting very scarce. Everyone is vrbo their rentals. Or to rent is over 2,000 dollars when you need two bedrooms and have pets.
- The only thing that would drive us out of this town is the gentrification that is happening right now. We would be heartbroken to leave, after living and contributing to, and loving this community. But we are a middle class, hardworking family for 4, and the possibility of buying a home now under \$350,000 is increasingly dismal.
- Over regulation, high taxes or fees drive up mortgage too high
- The cost of living is really high here, especially for folks our age (late 20s to early 30s) trying to buy their first home, have kids, make a life. Since moving here we've had half a dozen dear friends our age move to Montrose because they couldn't afford to buy/rent here, or even find an apartment after a lease was up. We need more rental housing and more affordable options for first-time homebuyers or this town will lose the young people that help make it the raddest spot around!
- Mostly not being able to afford a home as a first time home buyer.
- While I own a place in Ridgway that is affordable, I'm afraid that other people like me (that could be friends and

- neighbors) will not be able to move here in the future.
- There is no housing available. Rent is too high for a single mom. Need a place that can allow pets.
- We're trying really, really hard to buy a house right now. But even with two relatively high incomes for the area and no dependents, it's a stretch and might not work. In that case, we'd follow our friends to Montrose.
- If housing becomes Cost of Living in addition to development not being planned properly - some of the larger housing development projects appear to be outgrowing proper infrastructure such as parking, etc.
- Affordability. Rising living expenses/housing costs. This was once one of the few affordable mountain towns left in CO with an active community (although still relatively expensive compared to our northern city neighbors). Unfortunately, I feel that cost is forcing many out esp. the younger generation.
- The dream of owning my home seems to be getting further and further out of reach, THERE IS NO AFFORDABLE HOUSING! There are also no job opportunities here, working three service jobs with highly fluctuating income with no benefits is not ideal for raising a family on. I feel Ridgway is becoming another Colorado mountain town where only rich retirees, trust-funders, and single rockclimbers/mountain bikers who live in tents will be able to reside here.
- It is not easy to survive here. A small population year-round, barely holds our heads above water 70% of the time. To keep going all depends on summer tourism. I look at this summer, the drought, the water pouring out of the

reservoir in Ridgway State Park, which I think is Ridgway's most vital tourism draw. It is the 'everyman' draw, appealing and attainable to many. Otherwise, Ridgway has one motor lodge, a small-scale high-end spa, and somewhat of a handful of vacation rentals. I don't think becoming an overly exclusive community, of upscale appeal only, is sustainable. We survive on the everyman draw and the everyman people it takes to provide the services. Therefore, Ridgway MUST provide abundant affordable housing.

- If more housing options are not created i.e. rental, tiny homes a mix of housing opportunities one may have to leave Ridgway. Right now you have the original platted Town, River Park & Solar Ranches

none of which has multi-family or tinyhome components etc. The Town needs to focus on development that is on the west side of US 550 and allow density increases and zoning changes to provide a better housing/living (apartments) mix. If the Town is NOT going to work with developers and allow density increases one can take a look at Carbondale to see where real estate prices are heading when the only option for living in Ridgway is SF homes with some scattered duplex and triplexes. As far as renting without an apartment component to the Ridgway's density most folks will not be able to afford to rent a home.

When I first moved here at the age of 37 with my wife and two young children, I felt as if I were HOME for the first time in my life. I was in heaven, and still am..... but cautiously now. I am on guard as I see bigger changes happen that I have

seen before in our state. I am worried and saddened at the loss of what I love about Ridgway. We have all seen it so often in the west and in Colorado; beautiful towns changed and often corrupted by developers and people seeing dollar signs as the ultimate goal. This results in pushing out the common person and creating a different value structure and demographic. I admit I roll my eyes when I pass the benches and the "art" that sits around town posed as "an upgrade". Does this really serve the people of town? The "chic and shi-shi" vibe lends itself to exclusivity, higher real estate prices and attracting growth and development. This is deeply saddening for us both and our children. Why is growth and development always the pursuit? What about preserving humility, quiet, and wild places?

- Most recently, as rent on average have risen astronomically, and housing is booming so much that people who have lived here long time may be pushed out.
- Can't seem to build housing for people who need it, retired people on a fixed income can't live here
- When it is not easy to start a business or find housing opportunities.
- I am most disappointed that the community has not moved faster on affordable housing.
- When we don't support are fixed income residents
- Challenging to find rentals (we've tried to rent for 4 months in the summer and have had a tough time). There isn't much available between long term and short term
- When the real estate prices have gotten beyond affordable for the average person
- Not enough is being done to speed up the work to get affordable housing.
- Many of the landowners (building owners) are greedy. Sometimes when I hear the prices that people are charging for rentals, both living and commercial, I

- am appalled. Ridgway is amazing. But, let's be real, if someone is making \$15/ hr (which is about as high of a wage as most can make around here), and they are working 40 hours a week (most businesses are not able to employ full time/year round workers) then her entire first check and some of her second check is going to rent alone. That is insane to me. In order to attract young people, and to get the ones who grew up here to stay, they need to be able to pay for reasonable housing. We need young people!
- When I was trying to find affordable housing.
- When I see families who I know love this community moving away because they can't find affordable housing, when I hear friends speak in fear of what will happen the next time their rent goes up...
- "When "Ramp up Ridgway" begin. This signified the potential downfall of what drew me here and keeps me here. I am deeply saddened at the thought of turning Ridgway into a place where only people with lots of money can afford to own a house and live (which it has already become). If my family and I had not purchased a home when we did, we could not afford to buy or live here. When I dropped my kids off at the secondary school last year and for the first time, on the first day of school, saw a Mercedes, BMW, and Porsche drop kids off and pulled away from school. I had an instant sinking feeling in my gut. Shit.... we are officially screwed"

- Affordable housing. I'm tired of people complaining that we don't have affordable

housing and the town does NOTHING to change it. Like possibly changing the town rules & regulations to permit tiny homes or a tiny home development within the town limits. Year after year, this topic comes up and NOTHING is done to address it.

- Now, it is already too expensive and the building codes are ridiculous. Where can you have a tiny house? I applied for the new building project housing but I made \$5000 too much in income. The income limit was ridiculously low.

If we want a community where people can live, work, raise a family and support their communities full time it should be common sense that those who give life to the community be able to find housing here.

- When Town asphalted the roads in the downtown business streets and didn't do something besides asphalt and made Ridgway just another town to pass through.
- When they replaced all the street signs and then added propane tank seating that is uncomfortable to sit on. The spending doesn't seem to support our ranching and rural background.
- When the Town of Ridgway has MANDATORY fees for water, trash, recycle, and now trash cans! Stop putting your mandatory fees on us and allow us to choose if we want trash service or not - don't choose for us! Also,

This part of Planning does not even seem to be important ir considered. Growth for growth sake ISN'T the answer.

We are finding it difficult to make ends meet and we are in our fifties! Previously it didn't matter as much as we live in a beautiful area with lots of friends (who were also in our same predicament). We had a quality over quantity mindset. But as more and more people with money and means move in, we feel in the minority and economically poorer...lower class financially speaking. The quality is deteriorating somewhat. That sounds harsh. I still think Ridgway is a wonderful place but as a professionally employed Ridwayian my pay is not going up with the cost of living. Our utilities are over \$200 a month for each of our units (we have a duplex and live in one unit). Our rental is less than 500 sq feet yet we pay the same in water, sewage, trash as for a 3 bd 2 ba single family home.
- we will probably have to turn our house into a vacation rental and move somewhere the grocery store, gas station, and restaurants can be enjoyed on our income level, \$30 for a burger and fries and beer is tourist trap territory, and driving to city market once a week gets old, I have nothing good to say about our local Market except for Will that runs it, he has been awesome!
- Actually, most likely our dbl wide house will be converted to more upscale house and garage apartment, equaling more income for landlord. Gentrification, from my perspective ultimately down scaling

the neighborhood in terms of it being a fun relaxed and diverse place to live.

Economic Development

TOWN OF RIDGWAY RESIDENT

- Without attracting new businesses (not just retail and restaurants) to town, it will be difficult to sustain a viable workforce. Secondly, that workforce will need housing they can afford. Thirdly, those workers will need a good school system for their kids. ALL of these are lacking currently and all need to be addressed.
- The town certainly needs additional retail of all types. Very little shopping opportunity.
- I think job opportunities, available housing, and property prices are not completely controllable, and will always be a never ending factor. It's a market condition that is self-correcting. If there are no jobs, and you can't cyber commute to a job, then this will limit population. If population is self-limiting, then the property price/ available housing situation is self-managed.
- Learn from others mistakes. Don't let business drive constant growth. Limit marketing.

- I would love to see a better grocery store with more affordable and more extensive food and general merchandise options.
 Lots of money goes to City Market because of our grocery store.
- I would like to see a better system for small businesses to advertise to locals.
 The post boards are rarely successful and social media does not reach many people, (due to many residents not using it.)
- Take advantage of opportunities or offers from extremely wealthy land owners in the area.
- No more chain stores, restaurants, etc. that is unique and a lot of the town atmosphere will go away if we allow the chains to come in.
- "Small business is key to the economy and community. When business's do well they give back.
- Would be a game changer if there was a larger business here that fits our culture that could employee people from varying level of skills from manufacturer to management
- Supporting the businesses better and supporting the museums that are bringing in the tourism and \$\$'s

- Now is the time to start the above discussions mainly because the real estate in Ridgway is relativity still affordable. If one continues to kick the can down the preverbal road when it hits critical mass will the Town be able to afford the real estate even if it has to resort to condemnation?
- About half the questions in your survey is predicated on the idea that Ridgway must provide cheap housing, jobs for everyone who wants to be here and every other kind of amenity and service. If we don't

 Commercial residential is perfect zone for VRBO.
- Ridgway has had a vibrant home occupation situation and is now trying to commercialize that with 'space to create' while maintaining regulations that are disincentives to home occupation.
- having been more a telluride resident in the last 30 years, i watched that community grapple with similar issues-i.e. affordable housing and parking. they got a head-start on both and Ridgway shouldn't wait another day to start seriously addressing these quality-of-life issues.

some oversight with the architectural plans.

 subdivision to add a small amount of
 housing to the area, while still preserving

The front range is rapidly becoming very crowded and at times unlivable. Many people from there will be looking for their next place. the "cooler" Ridgway is the more growth pressure we will have.

- The recent UROD debate highlighted the need for a comprehensive development plan or vision for the future of the river corridor. A subcommittee should be tasked to provide a detailed vision / direction for the next couple of decades so the revised master plan can be used to steer future development in a way that the community clearly understands and supports. The river corridor is an opportunity both for residents and the tourists that visit the town. It is a neglected asset and the UROD is not the answer. The UROD should have been written AFTER there was a clear plan in place - however, the current master plan needs to correct that misstep and then any revisions needed can be made to the UROD.

The people who make parking decisions are not the ones impacted.
- According to Town Of Ridgway Municipal Code: The Town Council desires to maintain the character of community and neighborhoods, particularly as a "Real Community" and not just a tourist town; and The Town Council desires to assure a safe and quality experience for residents; and The Town has made a conscientious effort to plan for specific uses within all

zoning districts and to anticipate conflicts between competing land uses, in order to protect the public's health, safety and welfare. To ensure that this will not be detrimental to the character of the neighborhoods and property values in general. Citizen Comment: But, when the "Space to Create" building eliminates the present parking lot at Clinton and N. Laura St., those cars will be displaced. There is no "Effective Transition" (Ridgway Code term) between the Historic Business District and nearby Historic Residential Neighborhoods. Town's solution so far is to park the cars in Historic Residential Neighborhoods, with attendant disturbing noise and commotion. We realize that requiring parking for businesses in the Historic Residential Neighborhoods violates the intentions of the preceding codes. At the May 29th, 2018 Planning Commission meeting Mayor John Clark commented on a parking situation in the South Side of Ridgway, about "reserving the right to find a solution if traffic, safety, noise or other effect which interfere with reasonable enjoyment of surrounding properties becomes an issue". Councilor Hunter seconded. We see this impending issue becoming a reality by encouraging unlimited tourist, business and employee parking at all hours in the Historic Residential Neighborhoods.


ABOUT OUR SURVEY RESPONDENTS

In reviewing the survey results, it is important to first consider how accurately those who took the survey reflect the population of Ridgway as a whole. In any open survey such as this, there is the potential for bias in the results due to the fact that survey respondents are self-selecting (i.e., respondents chose to take the survey themselves; we did not prevent people from taking the survey if they were from a demographic group from which was already adequately represented in the survey). As a result of this self-selection bias, there are important demographic and socioeconomic differences between those who responded and Ridgway's population.


This is not to say that the results of this survey are wrong or not useful for the Master Plan process. We should not assume that a resident's opinion on a particular topic or issue is determined solely by socio-economic or demographic factors, just in the same way we should not assume that every member of a demographic or socio-economic group hold the same opinions. It does mean that the voices of certain groups are missing from these results, and will need to be sought out in future engagement activities to confirm the Master Plan and its goals and policies are supportive of the vision shared by all of Ridgway's residents, not just those who took this survey.

The following charts provide a summary of who took the survey. Where possible, data for respondents from Ridgway is compared to data from the U.S. Census Bureau. Note, the Census data is from 2016 (the most recent year for which data is available), and may not accurately reflect the population who lived in Ridgway while the survey was available.


Q31: How long have you lived (full time or part time) in Ridgway or the surrounding area?



Q32: What is your age?




How Do Survey Respondents Compare to Ridgway Residents?: Age




In general, older residents tended to be over-represented in the survey responses. Although they made up 18% of Ridgway's total population in 2016, residents 24 and younger are not represented in the survey. A youth activity in the schools is currently underway as a way to ensure the voices of our younger residents are considered in the process. Additional outreach events targeting those under 24 more generally may need to be considered to reach this segment of the population. On the other hand, nearly 26% of respondents were between the ages of 55 and 64 even though this age group accounts for only 14% of Ridgway's total population in 2016.

Q33: Do you have children under the age of 18?




How Do Survey Respondents Compare to Ridgway Residents?: Children under 18




At first glance, survey respondents appear more likely to have children under 18 than the population of Ridgway as a whole in 2016. If true, this suggests that the survey results disproportionately reflect the opinions of families with children. However, the data from the US Census Bureau measures households with children under 18 while the survey data is for individuals with children under 18. It may be that the parents of an 18 year old both filled out the survey, explaining why the percent of survey respondents with children under 18 is double that for the percent of households with children under 18. That said, it seems unlikely that this was the case in every single instance so it is impossible to say with certainty whether or not this bias exists in the responses.

Q34: What is your total household income?




How Do Survey Respondents Compare to Ridgway Residents?: Income




Income is another area where the survey respondents differ from the population as a whole. As the chart above shows, residents with incomes over \$75,000 were likely over-represented in the survey responses. However, it is uncertain the extent to which this was the case. The data from the U.S. Census measures households, not individuals. Since we did not limit multiple members of a household from taking the survey, it is possible that two members from the same household making \$75,000 responded to the survey, thus making a one-to-one comparison between the survey data and U.S. Census data inaccurate. Despite this, it is not unreasonable to assume that respondents to a perfectly representative survey would have a similar income distribution of that for households as whole. In addition, there is still a gap in responses from households making less than \$10,000 that is unlikely to be explained by this issue in comparing the data.


Q35: What is your current employment status? Please select the response that fits your employment situation best.
